Working dogs are heading to a water test in October and once back will begin training for our draft test in February. The show season starts up again at the end of September with some of our dogs strutting their stuff. Then in October and November there are four or five community events from Pumpkin festivals to Blessings of the Animals. And while all this is going on, our rescue volunteers continue to help the needs of dogs we take in. We can't do any of this without the extraordinary members who we can count on when things need to get done.

Take, for instance, Janine Packard, a member of the club since the early 2000. Recently, I placed a call to her because I needed to put "eyes" on a potential rescue to get a clear understanding what the dog's needs were. Janine was at this dog's home the next day. Her experience with Newfoundlands was critical in helping us evaluate what was happening with the dog and what the best path forward was. Without Janine looking at this dog first, there is every chance we would have done a disservice to the dog and a potential foster and adopter.

Then there is Miles and Jackie Conway. They endured losing two of their Newfoundlands within weeks of each other in the Spring. But when a call came from our Rescue Chair saying we needed to find another foster family for one of our dogs in rescue, they took a deep breath and took in Roxy. Miles and Jackie immediately addressed Roxy's ear infections and got her on a treatment plan to end the chronic cycle. They fell in love with this girl, and who wouldn't, but knew they were not ready emotionally to make

her a part of their home. When the time came for Roxy to be adopted, they wrote a detailed manual, of sorts, of all her likes, dislikes, routine and of course her medical needs. Roxy is a better dog because Miles and Jackie answered the call.

And I can't forget our working dog program. I called Jennifer Arent when the previous chair stepped down. When she and I talked about this position, she was extremely hesitant and took a couple of days to give me an answer. I am so thankful she took the position. Jennifer is bringing more attention to working dogs and getting more people involved in disciplines other than draft and water. She's leading by example, working her own dog Breezy in anything that sounds fun for them to do. The working dog program is all the better because Jennifer answered the call.

Every week, there is something that comes up in the club that needs a level of expertise, special care or just plain grunt work to make it happen. What do you bring to the club that we can tap into? I would sure love to hear from you and brag about you in the next newsletter.

I'm looking forward to seeing you at one of the many events this fall.



If Not NEWFFLA then Who?

Over the past two years, NEWFFLA has rescued 30 Newfoundlands and have found loving, caring homes for all. For an organization with 140 members, many who already having multiple Newfs, this shows the heart and dedication we have to our rescue mission. But what happens when a dog comes into our rescue, goes through our foster system, becomes available for adoption, and we can't find them a home? Believe it or not, this has happened leaving us scrambling to find other resources.

National Newfoundland Rescue (NNR) was founded early this year by rescue volunteers from across the country who saw a void in areas where regional clubs did not cover and for mix breed Newfoundlands that regional clubs do not handle. NNR has been clear from the beginning; to not overstep the great work the regional clubs are doing and forge partnerships with the clubs to work for the betterment of all Newfoundlands and the organizations that support them.

We have worked with NNR several times over the past couple of months. They reached out to us when they had a purebred Newfoundland being relinquished in Florida. We did a rescue to rescue transfer, and now the dog is happy in her new forever home with one of our members. With another dog, NNR provided a local applicant to us that suited the needs of rescue we had. She is now living her best life in Orlando with a new NEWFFLA member. NNR has also been there when every attempt to place a dog within our system, fails. They are able to cast a wider net to help find the dog the best home possible. We have also provided transportation support for a mixed Newf in St. Petersburg that needed to get to their new home.

Though it is our mission to find homes for all the dogs we take in, sometimes we need help to assure the dogs are properly placed. We have created a great partnership with NNR, one we hope to have for a long time. At the end of the day, "It's all about the dogs."

A Draft Life for Barron

My Name is Donna Viger and many of you know me by my dog Barron. We have been members of Newffla since 1999.

I first started my journey with Newfoundland dogs back in Colorado. My first Newf was JoeJoe and my only puppy. He was from a breeder that was producing PDA pups. Boy, I wish I would have known of the health risks back then. He underwent 2 heart surgeries before the age of 1 at Colorado State.

We moved to Florida in 2006 and of course JoeJoe came with along with several other housemates. JoeJoe also had severe hip dysplasia. He developed bone cancer in 2010 when we had to say goodbye. My journey had just begun

Over the years I have adopted a few more Newfs from Newffla and other rescue places. I have also fostered several until forever homes were found. I was also Rescue Chair for the club for a while so you can say rescue is in my blood.

We adopted Barron from Newffla in 2017 when he was three years old. I brought Barron with me to the 2019 Draft Test where I volunteered as a steward. Barron got to meet a lot of new people and I learned a lot about draft and thought Barron would enjoy the work. We ordered him a harness and won the bid for a cart at the 2019 St. Augustine Christmas Parade Auction. Barron absolutely loved to train and I loved being a part of the draft dog.

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Last year, at the age of seven, Barron earned his Beginner Draft Dog title. He was the only rescue to receive the title that year. Our journey will continue in February 2023 as we go for his Draft Dog title.

Now the strangest occurrence was when we drove to the exit ramp; we realized that the shelter we got Chumley from was at the next exit. There were horrible storms from Florida to Ohio and we were so intent on picking up Rosie we hadn't paid any attention to where Chumley had come from.

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.Now, we didn't try and match them, we never would. But, as Rosie grew, Chumley and her markings became so similar that everyone thinks they are related. (Personally, I think he may be her Great Uncle.)

Well, I send this as only Newf parents would understand this story. There is no difference where your Newfs come from; we are just blessed to be a part of their lives.
